Ms. Rogers reported that the fund is in the top 5% of national funds in comparison to similar funds. The fund is well diversified, well invested and very healthy.

Per Ms. Rogers, the first year the County contributed was 2004. If the County had been contributing in earlier decades the fund would have been better off. Putting in extra helps future years.

Informational item on the County's new recycling program for batteries.

Batteries should not be thrown in to the trash or recycling bins as they are a fire hazard. In addition to being able to recycle your rechargeable batteries at Lowes or Staples, the public may bring their batteries to the landfill location starting Friday, March 1st.

Batteries are a fire hazard from curbside collection, to transportation, to inside the recycling and waste facilities.

Last June, the landfill experienced two fires at the working face that were suspected to be caused by Lithium Batteries.

Every day we see batteries coming across the recycling lines and have experienced many nearmissed fires in our recycling facility. And those fires have been seen at the tipping floor (which is before processing) to the baled materials. After the material has been sorted and compressed into a bale, we have seen the bale smoking from a damaged battery pack. The type of batteries that we are seeing varies, commonly seen are drill/tool batteries, batteries from toys that are self-contained inside the item, vapes, and household batteries.

Battery-related fires are expected to grow, we are looking to prevent future harm and damage. We ask for your help to spread the message:

- 1. Keep batteries out of trash and recycling bins
- 2. For collection: To tape terminals (shiny sides) with packing or clear tape until proper disposal
- 3. Do not store long, especially rechargeable batteries, absolutely no longer than one year
- 4. Take batteries to proper locations, landfill location at 447 alexander drive, Montgomery, Staples, or Lowes
- 5. When coming to the landfill, follow the signs to the scale house (as you would with trash or TVs), we have a separate container for battery collections
- 6. Keep batteries separated by chemistry type, best you can
- 7. We will accept from residents from our service areas to promote keeping these items out of the waste/recycling stream (service areas include the following counties: Lycoming, Northumberland, Union, Snyder, Montour, and Columbia)

What we accept (no charge):

- I. Alkaline batteries AA, AAA, C, D, etc.
- 2. Lithium batteries rechargeable and non-rechargeable (includes button cell batteries)
- 3. Nickel Cadmium (Ni-Cd)
- 4. Nickel Metal Hydride (NiMH)
- 5. Battery containing units items with batteries that cannot be taken out, like an electric toothbrush, tools and toys that the battery cannot come out
- 6. Lead acid car batteries and jump start packs
- 7. For Damaged/Broken/Swollen batteries contact our office first

What we CANNOT accept:

- I. VAPES
- 2. Electric Vehicle Batteries
- 3. Large battery containing units that would not fit into our Gaylord box (48"x40"x36") (4'x3'x3')
