

Marc Lovecchio is a Judge of the Court of Common Pleas of Lycoming County, Pennsylvania. He has resided in Williamsport since 1987 when he relocated from Pittsburgh with his wife, Angela Campana Lovecchio, a city native. They have three children: Francis – 29; Peter – 27; and Louise – 21. Angela is a licensed attorney working as a Guardian Ad Litem for dependent children.

Judge Lovecchio graduated from Princeton University in 1980 and from the University Of Pittsburgh School Of Law, Cum Laude, in 1984. He was an Editor of the Law Review. He practiced in Pittsburgh for Tucker Arensberg, P.C. concentrating in civil defense and employment and labor law. Upon moving to Williamsport, he practiced as a partner at Campana, Lovecchio & Morrone, P.C. for many years in numerous areas of law in federal, state and administrative courts.

Judge Lovecchio was elected to the bench in 2009 and retained in 2019. He is now serving his second term. He is assigned primarily to the criminal docket and has presided over all types of criminal cases from summary offenses to first degree felonies and capital homicides. He is the Administrative Judge for the Adult Probation Office. He initiated and presides over the 24/7 Sobriety Program, the Mental Health Forensic Review Team, the High School Attendance Improvement Court, the Medication Assisted Treatment Court and the Underage Drinking Court. He participates and is a member of the Inns of Court and the Bench Bar Committees. He recently served as Pennsylvania's judicial representative to the National Judicial Opioid Task Force.

He is active in the Pennsylvania Conference of State Trial Judges. He previously served on the Education Committee for several years, he initiated and serves on the Criminal Law Committee and he is presently an officer. He is slated to be president of the Pennsylvania Conference of State Trial Judges in 2024.

He remains active in the community as president of Balls Mills Soccer Club and as the head high school soccer coach of South Williamsport girls' soccer team. He is a member of St. Joseph, the Worker Parish in Williamsport. He lectures in the community and at local educational institutions on various criminal topics such as the death penalty, victims' rights, substance abuse and gun laws.
