This would allow staff to establish Emergency Support Staff (ESFs) functions according to the National Incident Management System (NIMS) and corresponds to the requirements of the National Response Plan (NRP). Preliminary cost estimates have been reduced to roughly \$750,000 with the County providing a significant portion of the labor.

Most hospitals are supplied with backup electricity connections. In the event of a power failure, hospitals can maintain operations with emergency generators. Hospitals have little control, however, over the local road network. If gale force winds down trees, blocking primary routes to local hospitals, response times may be lengthened. In response to severe weather, municipalities should make every effort to maintain established emergency routes. It is recommended that each municipality identify its emergency routes that provide access to critical facilities. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) provides post-disaster funding to municipalities for temporary clearance of these "lifelines." Furthermore, these roads may be eligible for federal aid from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA). The FHWA provides funding to repair roads and bridges within the federal aid system that have been damaged by natural hazards.

Muncy Valley Campus of the Susquehanna Health System is located mostly in the 500-year flood plain. However a portion is in the 100-year floodplain. Although water has not entered the first floor of the facility, basement water is not unusual. The heating plant, etc. is in the basement. If the utilities in this facility were elevated to above the 100-year floodplain, return to the facility after a major flood event would be less expensive and more immediate.

PEMA's guide, Disaster Preparedness Planning for Facilities available at http://www.pema.state.pa.us provides an excellent framework for development of emergency plans. The long-term protection of water quality in the County is essential to the continued availability of potable water to the County's public water suppliers. Several types of regulatory and non-regulatory protection techniques exist that could be used to protect the County's ground water sources for existing or potential future use. Other broader methods of source water protection, including aquifer and watershed protection and management, exist to protect water sources from contamination. These include zoning, subdivision, and land development conditions of wellhead easements as well as a number of other measures incorporated into the County of Lycoming Water Supply Plan.

A growing number of residences are obtaining their water supply from privately drilled wells. It is unlikely that many property owners are fully aware of the risk floods pose to their water supply. Even if floodwaters do not overtop a well, contaminated groundwater can seep into well water, making it unfit for domestic use or consumption for weeks following a flood event. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) publishes free documents that provide property owners with a wealth of options for protecting private wells and utility systems.

Impervious surfaces created by development, such as parking lots, roads, and roofs, can substantially increase runoff within a watershed. The installation of storm sewer pipes, which control the runoff rates associated with development, prevents water from infiltrating the soil. Although stormwater management is necessary to control erosion and discharge rates, it is typically approached on a project-by-project basis. Municipalities are not required, under any law, to consider stormwater management on a watershed basis. Act 167 requires Counties to do stormwater management by watershed planning. Once completed municipalities are required to adopt ordinances compliant with that plan. The newer requirements require that post development may not exceed quantity and rate of pre-development.

Pennsylvania's Stormwater Management Program provides funding to counties for the development of stormwater management plans for designated watersheds. These plans are designed to evaluate existing drainage problems within the basin, consider potential impacts of flood control projects and land development regulations upon the hydrologic system, and make recommendations for minimizing accelerated runoff. The County of Lycoming will continue to complete these plans as funding allows.

As of 1993, the County Assessment Office had identified over 4,700 mobile homes, a 7 percent increase from the 1990 Census. Mobile homes are vulnerable to floods in two circumstances: (1) mobile homes are often heated with fuel oil tanks; if damaged during a flood event, fuel tanks can leak into the homes and impregnate the wood, rending the property unfit for human habitation; (2) unanchored mobile homes are buoyant and can easily be carried away by rampaging floodwaters. Should they accumulate behind a low-lying bridge, these mobile homes create a damming effect, causing water levels to rise.

# 8.0 Implementation

## **♦** Adoption

It is recommended that the County of Lycoming Hazard Mitigation Plan be adopted by resolution and be considered as an amendment to the updated County Comprehensive Plan as an amendment to the County Emergency Operations Plan (EOP). Resolutions of commitment from participating municipalities are required by the DMA 2000 in order to receive certain post-disaster assistance.

### ◆ Evaluation Timetable

This document should be reviewed and updated on a periodic basis. Preferably, the plan should be re-evaluated in the aftermath of any major hazard event to determine if certain mitigation action steps need to be undertaken or re-prioritized. In the absence of a major incident, the plan should be updated every five years including continuation of public input solicitation.

## **♦** Funding Resources

A directory of funding resources that municipalities can utilize to advance their own hazard mitigation efforts is located in **Appendix E**. The County has successfully utilized a number of these programs, particularly the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program and Flood Mitigation Assistance Program, and is available to provide technical assistance to municipalities evaluating their mitigation alternatives. However, because program requirements and funding levels often change each fiscal year, interested parties should consult with the administering agencies to obtain current program guidelines and to discuss potential projects.

It is expected that most funding for antiterrorism as well as for counterterrorism measures will be funneled through traditional Federal and State channels. Maintaining task force liaison as well as regular communication with representatives of PEMA, PA Department of Health, Office of Homeland Security and other State Agencies will enhance capability to fund potential terrorism mitigation activities.

# Project Impact: Building a Disaster Resistant Community

Project Impact aims to reduce damage to life and property associated with natural hazards. By identifying risks, assessing vulnerabilities, and prioritizing prevention strategies, Project Impact communities position themselves to respond effectively during a hazard event. Not only are lives and property saved, but also businesses remain productive and repair costs are minimized. What began as a pilot project has expanded to some 200 communities nationwide. The importance of hazard mitigation planning cannot be under-emphasized. Proposed amendments to the Stafford Act (currently pending in Congress) would require local governments to develop mitigation plans in order to received federal hazard mitigation funding. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) already requires projects be consistent with a statewide Hazard Mitigation Plan as a pre-requisite to receive certain grant assistance (e.g. FEMA's Hazard Mitigation Grant Program).

# ◆ Eligible Applicants

FEMA mostly provides technical assistance to Project Impact communities. However, in conjunction with Environmental Systems Research Institute (ESRI), the nation's leading provider of Geographic Information Systems (GIS) technology, FEMA has been able to provide seed money for innovative projects. In 1999, ESRI unveiled its <a href="Challenge Grant Program">Challenge Grant Program</a>, which provided software and hardware to communities utilizing GIS as a part of their disaster-resistant strategy. ESRI's grant programs are typically not ongoing. However, due to the success of the Project Impact initiative, a second grant round is likely. Interested parties must be newly designated Project Impact Communities.

# Hazard Mitigation Grant Program

The Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief & Emergency Assistance Act of 1988 established the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program. A key purpose of the HMGP is to ensure that communities coordinate mitigation efforts before disaster strikes. It defines mitigation as "...any sustained action taken to reduce or eliminate long-term risk to people and property from natural hazards and their effects." Within the Commonwealth, the state solicits applications from eligible applicants and submits a funding request to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) on a single application. The Commonwealth also manages approved projects. Projects must satisfy the following minimum criteria in order to be considered eligible for funding:

- Projects must contribute to the overall development plan or hazard mitigation plan for the area
- Projects should clearly reduce loss of life, economic hardship, and damage to critical facilities
- Projects should have the greatest potential to reduce future losses

Federal funds may provide up to 75 percent of total approved project costs. However, any one state cannot receive more than 15 percent of HMGP dollars appropriated for in any given fiscal year.

# Public Assistance Program

Designed to provide supplemental resources to states and local governments in the event of a federal disaster declaration, the Public Assistance Program (authorized by the Stafford Act) provides grant funds for the following:

- Debris removal
- Implementation of emergency protective measures
- Permanent restoration of infrastructure

Following a Presidential disaster declaration and a designation for public assistance by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), eligible applicants may apply for recovery funds. Federal assistance is typically 75 percent of eligible costs.

# **♦** *Eligible Applicants*

State government agencies; local governments (e.g. county, city, borough, regional authority); Indian tribes; and private nonprofit organizations whose primary purpose is to provide a public service.

# **♦** Administering Agency

The State (in this case, PEMA) works in conjunction with the Federal Emergency Management Agency to manage the program and monitors grants that have been awarded.

# Flood Mitigation Assistance Program

After the Great Midwest Floods of 1993, the federal government sought ways to enhance participation in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) and to reduce federal disaster assistance expenditures. The Flood Mitigation Assistance Program was established with the passage of the National Flood Insurance Reform Act of 1994. In addition to tightening requirements for participation in the NFIP, the Act established a program that encourages communities to identify their flood vulnerabilities and to reduce their flood risk. Through the Flood Mitigation Assistance Program, FEMA offers two types of grants: (1) *Planning Grants* to develop or update Flood Mitigation Plans; and (2) *Project Grants* to implement measures to reduce flood losses. To be considered eligible, projects must directly benefit a National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) participating community. If seeking 'project grant' assistance, the proposed activity must conform with the applicant's Flood Mitigation Plan. Examples of eligible projects include:

- Elevation of insured structures
- Acquisition of insured structures and real property
- Relocation or demolition of insured structures
- Dry floodproofing of insured structures
- Minor, localized structural projects that are not fundable by State or other Federal programs
- Beach nourishment activities such as planting of dune grass

# **♦** *Eligible Applicants*

Communities that participate in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP); any state agency, a qualified local organization.

# ♦ Administering Agency

The State receives a direct grant from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and administers FMA funds through the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency (PEMA). PEMA establishes Pennsylvania's mitigation priorities, reviews grant applications, and provides technical assistance.

The largest of FEMA's non-disaster grant programs, the Emergency Management Performance Grant (EMPG) has combined several FEMA funding streams into one grant program. The EMPG program encourages the development of comprehensive emergency management, including planning, preparedness, mitigation, response, and

recovery capabilities. While only States are eligible to receive EMPG grants, each state can sub-grant funds to units of local government based upon local emergency management priorities. EMPGs can be used to address emergency management needs in several functional areas:

- Laws and Authorities
- Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment
- Hazard Management
- Resource Management
- Planning
- Direction, Control, and Coordination
- Communications and Warning
- Operations and Procedures
- Logistics and Facilities
- Training & Exercises
- Public Education and Information
- Finance and Administration

# Radiological Emergency Response Fund (Act 147 of 1984)

The Radiological Emergency Response Fund, supported with fees assessed nuclear power plants, provides financial assistance to the twenty-six (26) designated RISK and SUPPORT counties to assist with the development of a detailed nuclear emergency response plan for areas surrounding each nuclear electrical generation facility, nuclear fabrication and away-from-reactor storage facility located in the Commonwealth. The program also supports training and equipment needs of State and local emergency response personnel

# Local Level Training Program

The State Fire Academy's Local Level Training Program provides on-site training to firefighters and emergency management personnel in the effective use of equipment and apparatus. Working in conjunction with Education Training Agencies, the State Fire Academy provides accredited instructors and curriculum on a range of subjects, such as arson detection, terrorism awareness, hazardous materials management, and incident command. Since the 1930s, this local level program has provided free and limited-fee training on an "as-needed, where-needed" basis. In addition to the Local level Training Program, the State Fire Academy has co-sponsored Fire College Weekend, an annual training program organized by the Central Area Fire Chiefs' Association of Lycoming County, Bucks County's Public Safety Training Center, and the the County of Lycoming Department of Public Safety. Since 1990, Fire College Weekend has been held in the City of Williamsport, attracting an average of 1,000 participants from throughout the Commonwealth.

# Emergency Medical Services Operating Fund (EMSOF)

Since the early 1980s, the Emergency Medical Services Operating Fund (EMSOF) has grown with the number of reported moving violations, which averages 1.2 million. For each reported moving violation in the Commonwealth, violators are charged \$10 (\$25 if DUI is involved). Each year, surcharges collected by county courthouses are submitted

to the State Treasurer's Office and reallocated to the state's sixteen (16) regional EMS councils. Under the guidance of the state Department of Health, regional Development Plans are prepared by each of Pennsylvania's EMS councils. These Development Plans establish project priorities and funding caps for the region's EMSOF allocation. Under special circumstances (i.e. financial hardship), the Department may increase its EMSOF reimbursement to support essential needs of ambulance and quick response services (QRS). Regional communication systems are an eligible use of EMSOF; however, all funding requests must satisfy the regional development priorities established by the appropriate EMS council. The following list highlights the range of projects and activities that can be supported through EMSOF:

- Regional EMS Development Plan Initiatives
- Quality Assurance/Improvement Initiatives
- Data Collection
- Training Equipment
- EMS Management Development Training Programs
- Recruitment and Retention Programs
- Eligible Equipment

Because EMSOF does not support the EMS System in its entirety, rural EMS providers are generally required to contribute 40% and non-rural providers are generally required to contribute 50% of the funds granted for essential equipment.

# Community Revitalization

For the past two years, this program has been allocated an unprecedented \$84.6 million by the General Assembly. Perhaps the most flexible of DCED's grant programs, Community Revitalization supports improvement projects that satisfy one or more of the following objectives:

- Improve the stability of the community;
- Promote economic development;
- Improve existing and develop new civic, cultural, recreational, industrial

and other facilities;

- Assist in business retention, expansion, creation or attraction;
- Promote the creation of jobs and employment opportunities; and
- Enhance the health, welfare and quality of life of Pennsylvania citizens.

The administering agency makes every effort to distribute appropriations evenly throughout the fiscal year. However, because a single application is utilized for all DCED grant programs, applications for other grant opportunities may be considered alongside a CR request. Applicants should seek support from their district Representatives and Senators to advance a CR application.

Applications may be submitted at any time, but should not exceed one application during any fiscal year, which runs from July 1 through June 30. DCED regulations do not establish required minimum or maximum requests. However, the program has historically provided awards ranging from \$10,000 to \$50,000.

# Hazardous Material Emergency Planning & Response Act

Building upon the Emergency Planning & Community Right-to-Know Act (EPCRA), Act 165 designates Local Emergency Planning Committees (LEPCs) as the responsible entities for developing off-site emergency response plans, a requirement for every SARA facility in the Commonwealth. Off-site emergency response plans are developed in addition to a county's general emergency operations plan and must be reviewed by PEMA on an annual basis. Counties that adequately demonstrate an ability to manage HAZ MAT incidents will receive reimbursement from the Hazardous Materials Response Fund, which "stores" each county's fees within a fenced account. These fees enable local governments to support equipment, training and salaries of HAZ MAT personnel. In addition to the Hazardous Materials Response Fund, PEMA administers a matching grants program that can be utilized to provide equipment, training or salary reimbursement for first responder personnel (Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness Grant Program).

# Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness Grant (HMEP)

Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness (HMEP) grants are made to grantees designated by each state governor. The Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency (PEMA) is the designated grantee for the Commonwealth. Funded with registration fees collected from shippers and carriers of hazardous materials, the program supports the planning and training needs of first responders and local emergency planning committees (LEPCs) for enhanced hazardous materials response. All Pennsylvania counties have a Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) that ensures compliance with SARA Title III and the Commonwealth's Act 165. Act 165 (Hazardous Material Emergency Planning & Response Act) requires each LEPC to develop an off-site response plan for every SARA facility in the Commonwealth.

HMEP grants require a 20% soft match, which can be achieved with Act 165 funds or inkind contributions. In Pennsylvania, over \$370,000 in grant fees were collected for the 1998-1999 registration year as compared to a nationwide total of over \$7 million. The program continues its emphasis upon transportation-related HAZ MAT incidents.

Applications are typically due July of each year, with award announcements in September.



# Appendix J: Parts of a Floodplain


The identification and assessment of flood hazards within this document relies upon the use of the National Flood Insurance Program definition of regulatory floodplain (i.e. 100-year floodplain). Although the definition of "regulatory floodplain" does not encompass the entire area subject to flooding, it is the minimum area required to be regulated by the National Flood Insurance Program. The one-hundred year floodplain (sometimes called the 1% flood or base flood) is commonly accepted as a "national standard" for planning, design and regulation purposes.

The cross-section depicted below shows the various parts of the regulatory floodplain. The following definitions will be used throughout this plan:

- ♦ **Floodway**—The designated part of the regulatory floodplain that carries and discharges floodwaters of a 100 year flood without cumulatively raising the flood elevation.
- ♦ Floodway Fringe or Flood Fringe—The designated part of the regulatory floodplain outside the floodway.
- ♦ **Regulatory Floodplain**—The basis for floodplain management—the 100 year flood elevation—includes both the floodway and the flood fringe.
- ♦ **500 Year Floodplain**—The designated area that is vulnerable to the 500 year flood
