#### Juvenile Justice Week

October 4-10, 2020

Elementaria Pennsylvania's juvenile justice system is charged with providing programs of supervision, care and rehabilitation which provide balanced attention to the protection of our communities, the imposition of accountability for offenses committed by juveniles and the development of competencies to enable children who come within the jurisdiction of the juvenile justice system to become responsible and productive members of their communities; and

Whereas, the mission of Pennsylvania's juvenile justice system is based on the principles of restorative justice, which give priority to repairing the harm done to crime victims and communities, and which define offender accountability in terms of assuming responsibility and taking action to repair harm; and

Whereas, this mission is premised on the belief that crime victims, communities, and juvenile offenders must all be regarded as clients of the juvenile justice system, who should receive tangible benefits from their interactions with the system; and

Whereas, the Governor's Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Committee has adopted the following mission statement for Pennsylvania's juvenile justice system:

"Juvenile Justice: Community Protection; Victim Restoration; Youth Redemption"; and

Whereas, community protection refers to the fundamental right of all Pennsylvania citizens to both be and feel safe from crime. Victim restoration emphasizes that crime can forever change its victim and that the goal of victim restoration programs and services should be to restore crime victims, to the greatest extent possible, to their pre-crime status. Youth redemption embodies the belief that the vast majority of juvenile offenders are capable of change and have strengths upon which treatment services can build; and

Whereas, all of the services designed and implemented to achieve this mission and all hearings and decisions under Pennsylvania's Juvenile Act – indeed all aspects of the juvenile justice system – must be provided in a fair and unbiased manner; and

Whrreas, counties throughout Pennsylvania sponsor annual Juvenile Justice Week activities to enhance public understanding of our juvenile justice system and pay tribute to all those who are part of this important effort.

Therefore, in special recognition of the Lycoming County Juvenile Probation Office in their work with juvenile offenders, crime victims, and communities, we, the Commissioners of Lycoming County, do hereby proclaim October 4-10, 2020, as Juvenile Justice Week in Lycoming County.



#### PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, domestic violence impacts our families, homes, communities, schools, institutions, and workplaces on a daily basis; and

WHEREAS, individuals can be victims of domestic violence regardless of age, gender identity, sexual orientation, race, culture, socioeconomic status, or religion; and

WHEREAS, without intervention, cycles of violence perpetuate through generations; and

WHEREAS, during the month of October, domestic violence advocacy agencies, systems-partners, communities, and allies come together to connect those who work to end violence, to celebrate those who have survived, and to mourn those who have died because of domestic violence; and

WHEREAS, it is critical that those seeking help or services have access to proper care and treatment; and

WHEREAS, domestic violence prevention is the best form of victim services, and just as public health's systematic approaches have helped mitigate a range of threats once thought to be intractable, they can also help to prevent domestic violence;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Commissioners of Lycoming County hereby proclaim the month of October, 2020, as Domestic Violence Awareness Month in Lycoming County, and encourage the community to both spread awareness of domestic violence and support families affected by it throughout the County.
