WHEREAS, the Pennsylvania's correctional system is the oldest in the our nation, advancing from the original establishment of Philadelphia's Walnut Street Jail in 1773 and the Eastern Penitentiary in 1829; and

WHEREAS, the "Pennsylvania System," as it became known, was the principal influence in the development of penology throughout the 19th Century and set in motion modern corrections; and

WHEREAS, today, Pennsylvania faces continued difficult challenges in corrections. With twenty-three state correctional institutions, one training academy, one motivational boot camp, two central office buildings, fourteen community corrections centers, forty contract facilities, sixty-three county prisons and jails, and ten federal facilities and offices, our correctional facilities house approximately 73,350 inmates; and

WHEREAS, the secure and safe operation and management of those facilities rests in the hands of nearly 31,500 trained, skilled, and devoted corrections professionals. They are corrections administrators, business administrators and purchasing agents, corrections officers, counselors, treatment specialists, educators, clerical support staff, personnel and labor relations specialists, social workers, clergy, medical professionals, food service specialists, computer technicians, reentry specialists, parole agents, parole supervisors and administrative positions, planners and research analysts, and skilled craftspeople upon whose skills, efficiency and professionalism that the Pennsylvania correctional system relies heavily upon; and

WHEREAS, although each of these dedicated professionals works in a different field and specializes in a specific area, they are all committed to a common goal: the secure, safe, and humane operation of our commonwealth's correctional facilities where the employees work to lessen future crime through the delivery of programs and guidance to try diligently to change the individual's criminal behavior; and

WHEREAS, beginning in 2020, the commonwealth was faced with its first public health pandemic emergency in over 100 years with the detection of COVID-19. Individuals who work in the parole and correctional fields demonstrate exceptional levels of dedication to protecting the health and welfare of all the inmates, prisoners, parolees, and re-entrants and each other across the Commonwealth, and continue to do so today.

NOW THEREFORE, the Commissioners of Lycoming County hereby proclaim the week of May 1st -7th, 2022 as <u>"INSTITUTIONAL PAROLE AND CORRECTIONS EMPLOYEE WEEK"</u> in Lycoming County. Goals

Pennsylvania Arboviral Surveillance Network

Protection and County Government

• Gain a better understanding of the distribution, density, and phenology of the ticks of Pennsylvania

- Infection Rate of Ixodes scapularis Nymphs and Adults
 - Human Infection rates
- Surveillance is conducted in Spring Summer Months (April-August)
- Adult Surveillance Conducted Fall/Winter Months (October-April)



Surveillance Breakdown and Focus

- Ixodes scapularis and pathogens they carry in public use areas
 - County or Municipal Parks
 - State Game Lands
 - State Parks- 72% sampled
 - State Forests- 70% sampled
- Fall/Winter Surveillance Target Ixodes scapularis adults- October
 - Borrelia burgdorferi, Anaplasma phagocytophilum, Babesia microti, Borrelia miyamotoi, Deer Tick Virus (Powassan Virus Lineage II), Borrelia mayonii
- Spring/Summer Ixodes scapularis nymphs- mid April-August
 - Utilize existing infrastructure of county level mosquito control programs- 45; the other 22 are surveyed by DEP staff- minimum of 2 sites sampled biweekly
 - · Provide Grant funding to the Counties to conduct this work
 - Borrelia burgdorferi, Anaplasma phagocytophilum, Babesia microti













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H. longicornis Distribution

Amblyomma maculatum Distribution






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Deer Tick Virus

 - 116 positives in 17 counties
 - "Hotspots" in Clearfield, Centre, Wyoming Counties
 - Statewide infection rate- 0.6% excluding hotspots

Deer Tick Virus


- Powassan Virus Lineage II
 - Transmitted by Ixodes scapularis
 - Transmitted in 15 minutes
- Human Health Impacts
 - Flu-like symptoms
 - 78% will develop severe neuroinvasive disease
 - 12% end in death





Deer Tick Virus

- Public signs were developed and hung
- Control measures will be conducted to reduce the tick populations and risk
 - Permethrin Barrier Spray
 - Tick tubes



Personal Protection Measures

- · Permethrin (Good for 6 washes)
- Repellent containing DEET
- Light colored clothing
- · Tuck shirt into pants and pants into socks
- · Perform regular tick checks while in the field
- Check yourself and pets for ticks
- · Put clothes in dryer
- Shower after field wor
- Tick Removal








Personal Protection Measures

How to Remove a Tick

- 1. As soon as possible use fine tipped tweezers to grasp the tick close to the skin's surface.
- 2. Pull upward with steady and even pressure. Do not twist or jerk the tick as this can cause the mouthparts to break off and remain in the skin.
- 3. After thoroughly removing the tick, clean the bite area and your hands with rubbing alcohol or soap and water.
