

Seedlings: \$15 for 10

American Hazelnut, American Persimmon, Chestnut Oak, Red Oak, Silky Dogwood, Sugar Maple, and Winterberry Holly.

Bareroot Fruit Trees: \$20 each.

Eastern White Pine	10-20"	Evergreen: Has soft, long needles. Grows rapidly in a variety of soil and prefers
		sun. Extremely hardy. Grows to 6 feet in 8-11 years. Max 100ft.
Colorado	Colorado Blue Spruce	Evergreen: Has blue-green color. Can grow 50-75 feet. Good windbreak.
Blue Spruce		Popular Christmas tree. Grow to six feet in 10-12 years. Max 100ft
Norway Spruce	10-16"	Evergreen: Highly valued ornamental and timber tree. One of the best conifers
		for shelters and windbreaks. Fast growing Max.75-80'
Chestnut Oak	8-16"	Height and spread to 60 feet. Can tolerate poor, dry, rocky soil. Acorns are rich
		dark brown with a very sweet taste. Relished by squirrels, deer and other wildlife.
Red Oak	8-16"	Fast growth 60 to 70 feet with equal spread. Grows best in sandy to rich loamy
		soil in full sun. The fastest growing of all oaks. Tolerant of urban conditions such
		as salt.
Sugar Maple	8-16"	Mature trees provide sugar products from sap in the spring. Brilliant yellow, burnt
		orange and limited red tones in autumn. A good timber tree. Height 60' to 75'
American Hazelnut	6-12"	Also known as American Filbert. Medium fast growth rate. A multi-stemmed small
		tree growing 10 to 15 feet in height. Dark green summer foliage turns light yellow
		in fall. Edible nuts mature September to October.
American Persimmon	6-12"	Fruit is mostly used in in jams and jellies. Showy fall color and provide wildlife
		food.
Silky Dogwood	8-16"	Grows to 9 feet. Grows best in well drained, moist soil. Berries attract birds. Very
		good for soil erosion on banks.
Winterberry Holly	18-30"	Attractive shrub. Provides red berries through the winter. Good wetland plant.
		Likes acidic soil. Should plant several for good pollination.
