National Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day

Each year on Dec. 7, Pearl Harbor Survivors, veterans, and visitors from all over the world come together to honor and remember the 2,403 service members and civilians who were killed during the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941. A further 1,178 people were injured in the attack, which permanently sank two U.S. Navy battleships (the USS *Arizona* and the USS *Utah*) and destroyed 188 aircraft.

On Aug. 23, 1994, the United States Congress designated Dec. 7 as National Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day. Every year, remembrance events are held at the Pearl Harbor National Memorial, culminating in a commemoration ceremony on December 7th.



Ingredients	100 servings	servings					
Peas, blackeyed	6 pounds						
Ham bones or rind	1 pound (1 No. 56 dipper) ¼ ounce (1 mess kit spoon) 6 pounds (3 No. 56 dippers)						

- 1. Cover peas with boiling water. Add ham bones or rind, onions and pepper.
- 2. Cover and heat to boiling point; boil 1 hour.
- 3. Place rice on top of other ingredients. Add enough water to cover rice.
- Cover and heat to boiling point; reduce heat and simmer, without stirring, about 30 minutes or until rice is tender.

Yield: 100 servings, approximately 2/3 cup each.

Instructions Application for Homestead & Farmstead Exclusions

BASIC INFORMATION

Please complete the parcel number, ownership information, property location, municipality and school district. Please list a daytime and evening phone number where you may be reached in the event that there are any questions.

HOMESTEAD INFORMATION

- Only a primary residence may receive the homestead exclusion. This is the fixed place of abode where the owner
 intends to reside permanently until the person moves to another home. You may be asked to provide proof that this
 property is your primary residence, such as your driver's license, your voter registration card, your personal income
 tax form, or your local earned income tax form.
- 2. Do you have another residence which you claim as your primary residence? For instance, do you claim another state as your primary residence or another county in Pennsylvania? The Homestead Exclusion can only be claimed once, for a place of primary residence. You may not claim this property as your primary residence if you claim another property as a homestead or if you receive a homestead tax abatement or other homestead benefit from any other county or state.
- If you live in a unit of a cooperative or a condominium and you pay all or a portion of your real property taxes jointly through a management agent or association, rather than paying your taxes separately from other units, circle yes.
- If you answered yes to question 3, provide your share of the ownership. You may be asked to provide a contact to confirm this information.
- Circle yes if the property for which you are seeking a homestead exclusion is used for other purposes, such as a business or rental property.
- If you answered yes to question 5, indicate what percentage of the property that is used as business or rental property.

FARMSTEAD INFORMATION

Only complete this section (questions 7, 8, and 9) if you are applying for a farmstead exclusion. If you answer yes to questions 8 a, b, or c, you may be asked to provide proof that the buildings and structures are used for commercial agricultural activity, such as the net income or loss schedule from your state or federal income tax forms.

- Only buildings and structures on farms which are at least ten contiguous acres in area, have been farmed in the last three years, and used as the primary residence of the owner are eligible for a farmstead exclusion. If your property includes at least ten contiguous acres of farmland, circle yes.
- 8. Circle yes if the buildings or structures are used primarily to:
 - Produce or store farm products produced on the farm for the purpose of commercial agricultural production.
 - b. House animals raised or maintained on the farm for the purpose of commercial agricultural production.
 - c. Store agricultural supplies or machinery and equipment used on the farm in agricultural production.
- Circle yes if any farm buildings or structures receive an abatement of property tax under any other law. (Such as corn cribs, silos, and plastic green houses.)

Change In Use

When the use of a property approved as a homestead or farmstead property changes so that the property no longer qualifies for the homestead or farmstead exclusion, the property owners must notify the Assessment Office within 45 days of the change in use. If the use of your property changes and you are not sure if it still qualifies for the homestead or farmstead exclusion, you should contact the Assessment Office at (570) 327-2301.

VA and 13 community health systems

pledge to share data to improve Veteran health care

WASHINGTON — Today, the Department of Veterans Affairs announced a <u>pledge</u> with 13 health care systems to share data to improve the Veteran experience regardless of where Veterans receive their health care — inside or outside of VA.

Through this <u>pledge</u>, VA and the 13 health care systems will work to improve Veteran health care by seamlessly exchanging information about care provided and requested; save money for Veterans by ensuring that they are taking advantage of VA and community resources; and connect Veterans with VA benefits, including new benefits for toxic exposure-related conditions under the <u>PACT Act</u>. As with all partnerships, VA will safeguard the privacy and security of Veteran information.

The health care systems partnering with VA in this effort are Emory Healthcare, Inova, Jefferson Health, Sanford Health, University of California Davis Health, Intermountain Health, Mass General Brigham, Rush Health, Tufts Medicine, Marshfield Clinic, Kaiser Permanente Health Plan and Hospitals, University of Pittsburg Medical Center, and Atrium Health.

"This pledge will improve Veteran health care by giving us seamless, immediate access to a patient's medical history, which will help us make timely and accurate treatment decisions," **said VA Under Secretary for Health Dr. Shereef Elnahal**. "It will also empower VA to send helpful information to our partner health systems that they can then offer to Veterans in their care — including information about new benefits we are offering under the PACT Act, nocost emergency suicide care, and more."

The data sharing goals outlined in this pledge could greatly benefit Veteran patients and the providers who care for them, while helping reduce financial burden for Veterans. For example, this type of information sharing could help inform a non-VA doctor that a Veteran experiencing an acute suicidal crisis should receive care at no cost, <u>under VA's new policy</u>. Additionally, it could inform a non-VA doctor about how the PACT Act could help a Veteran patient – thus empowering the provider to encourage that Veteran to file for benefits.

As a part of the pledge, VA and the participating health systems will continuously develop and provide capabilities that support three objectives:

- Accurately identify Veterans when they seek care from providers in the community.
- Connect Veterans with VA and community resources that promote health and health care

 especially VA services that lower Veterans' out-of-pocket expenses.
- Responsibly and reliably coordinate care for shared patients whether or not they are enrolled in VA health benefits, including exchange of information about care requested and provided.

Any health system or provider that supports the pledge's objectives is encouraged to participate. Those signing the pledge begin their work in October, striving to provide proof-of-concept in early 2024. Learn more about the <u>pledge</u> or contact <u>VeteranInteroperabilityPledge@va.gov</u>.

VA awards \$16 million to help Veterans with disabilities participate in adaptive sports

WASHINGTON — Today, the Department of Veterans Affairs announced that it awarded nearly \$16 million in grant funding to 91 national, regional, and community programs to help more than 13,000 Veterans and service members with disabilities participate in <u>adaptive sports</u>. This funding will help these organizations plan, develop, manage, and implement a variety of sports and equine therapy activities, including life-improving programs for Veterans and training for providers.

Adaptive sports are competitive or recreational sports and activities customized to fit the needs of Veterans with disabilities, including paralympic sports, archery, cycling, skiing, hunting, rock climbing, and sky diving. These activities allow Veterans to rehabilitate through recreation and encourage an active and fit lifestyle.

"These grants help ensure that Veterans with disabilities have access to sports and activities that build independence and quality of life," said **VA Secretary Denis McDonough**. "These heroes served and sacrificed for our country, and we are proud to help them play the sports they love."

Army Veteran Freddie De Los Santos joined the military after 9/11. After losing a leg in a devastating injury, he took up hand cycling as part of his rehabilitation. De Los Santos is now a para-cycling champion and proud to represent the U.S. through adaptive sports. He touts VA's Adaptive Sports program's benefits as a compliment to his VA health care services.

"The program helped me to incorporate myself back into society – mentally, socially, and physically," said **Army Veteran Freddie De Los Santos.** "It has been the most rewarding experience being able to compete despite my disability."

Over the last nine years, VA has awarded more than \$100 million in adaptive sports grants to improve Veterans' well-being and independence. Recipients of this year's grants are located in 30 states and Puerto Rico.

VA awards grants to a range of organizations, including Veterans Service Organizations, city and regional municipalities, and other community groups. In addition to equine therapy, the grants will support a variety of sports opportunities for disabled Veterans and disabled members of the Armed Forces, to include cycling, kayaking, archery, hunting and pickleball.

VA expands maternity care coordination for Veterans

WASHINGTON — Starting Oct. 1, Veterans will have access to maternity care coordinators from the beginning of their pregnancy to 12 months post-partum — an expansion from the previous end-date of 8 weeks post-partum. These coordinators help Veterans navigate health care inside and outside of VA, connect Veterans with care after delivery, ensure access to follow-up screenings, and <u>more</u>. This means that all new mothers will have the support and resources they need from VA, regardless of where they give birth.

This expansion is a key step toward improving maternal outcomes for Veterans and part of the work that VA is doing to implement the White House Blueprint for Addressing the Maternal Health Crisis. In addition to these maternity care coordinators, VA provides Veterans with the full range of maternity care services throughout pregnancy, delivery, and postpartum – including primary care, exams, tests, ultrasounds, newborn care, lactation support, and more.

Women Veterans are the fastest-growing cohort of Veterans who use VA, and VA currently provides health care to approximately 600,000 women Veterans — half of whom are of child-bearing age. Pregnancies in women Veterans using VA care have increased by more than 80% since 2014, from 6,950 pregnancies in 2014 to 12,524 in 2022.

"This expansion of care coordination is a critical step toward improving outcomes for Veteran mothers and their newborn children," said **Secretary of Veterans Affairs Denis McDonough.** "Now, Veteran mothers will know that they have one-on-one support throughout every step of their pregnancy — from the day it begins to one year postpartum."

"Evidence shows that new mothers often need support and care coordination long after 8 weeks post-partum, which is why VA is taking action to support Veteran mothers for much longer after they give birth," said **Under Secretary for Health Shereef Elnahal, MD.** "We will also screen pregnant and postpartum Veterans for social determinants of health, mental health risk factors, relationship health and safety, and more."

"Extended follow-up care for postpartum Veterans is a great step forward, given that a significant proportion of poor maternal outcomes happen later in the postpartum period," said **Acting Chief Officer for VA Office of Women's Health Sally Haskell, MD.** "Extending postpartum care coordination up to one year allows VA maternity care coordinators the ability to double the amount of contact with their patients to help improve the physical and mental health of both parent and child."

VA maternity care coordinators also screen for social, physical, and mental health concerns; answer questions about billing; provide resources for childbirth education; and offer lactation consulting during pregnancy and after delivery.

VA understands the importance of having a solid support system during and after pregnancy, so along with extended maternity care, the department offers essential wraparound services. In addition to primary care, this incudes access to mental health care, housing assistance, and resources to address food insecurity.

VA expands burial benefits for Veterans and their families

WASHINGTON — Today, VA announced that Veterans, and their families, caregivers, and survivors now have access to expanded burial benefits to help with end-of-life expenses related to a Veteran's gravesite, burial, funeral and transportation of remains to their final resting place. Burial benefits are available to individuals who pay for a Veteran's burial and funeral costs that are not reimbursed by any other organization. The updated burial benefits are:

- Expanded reimbursement of transportation expenses, to include costs for transporting remains, to state or Tribal Veterans' cemeteries in addition to previously eligible national cemeteries.
- Instituted a more generous single payment rate for non-service-connected burial benefits.
- Extended the VA plot or interment allowance to Tribal organizations. "Last fiscal year, VA delivered more than 84,000 burial benefits to families of Veterans," said **VA Under Secretary for Benefits Joshua Jacobs**. "Expanding burial benefits means we are able to ensure Veterans are honored in their final resting place, and assist their family, caregivers, and survivors during the difficult time of their loved one's passing."

VA provides burial benefits for all legal burial types, including cremation, burial at sea, and donation of remains to a medical school. Eligible individuals include a surviving spouse or legal partner, surviving child, parent or executor of the Veteran's estate. Additionally, VA may pay burial benefits to a funeral home or third party who handled burial arrangements for a Veteran whose remains are unclaimed.

Veterans are encouraged to plan with end-of-life benefits provided by VA. These benefits include VA life insurance, care preferences, survivor benefits, and burial benefits that can be applied for in advance of a Veteran's passing. Visit www.va.gov/plan-ahead to learn more.

There is no time limit to file for a service-connected burial, plot or interment allowance, or the transportation benefit. However, claims for non-service-connected burial benefits must be filed within two years of the Veteran's burial or cremation. A non-service-connected burial benefit is one where the cause of death was not related to military service.


